ABOUT ARNAU PÉREZ

[Arnau Pérez](#) is a dance artist born in Blanes, Spain. As a choreographer, his pieces have been performed all around the world, including tours in Southern Europe and Central America. His work is characterized by its dynamic content in relation to his urban background, which permits the staging of different skills and movement contrasts. In his creations, Pérez emphasizes the global use of the space together with the meticulous composition related to the concept of the piece.

His work *Young Blood* was awarded the public and the Young Jury Award at the 32nd Choreographic Contest of Madrid, which has given Pérez the chance to travel to Washington, D.C. in 2019 and present his site-specific work. The award also grants him the opportunity to participate in the [International Choreographer Residency](#) Program at the *American Dance Festival* during a six-week period in Durham, North Carolina.
