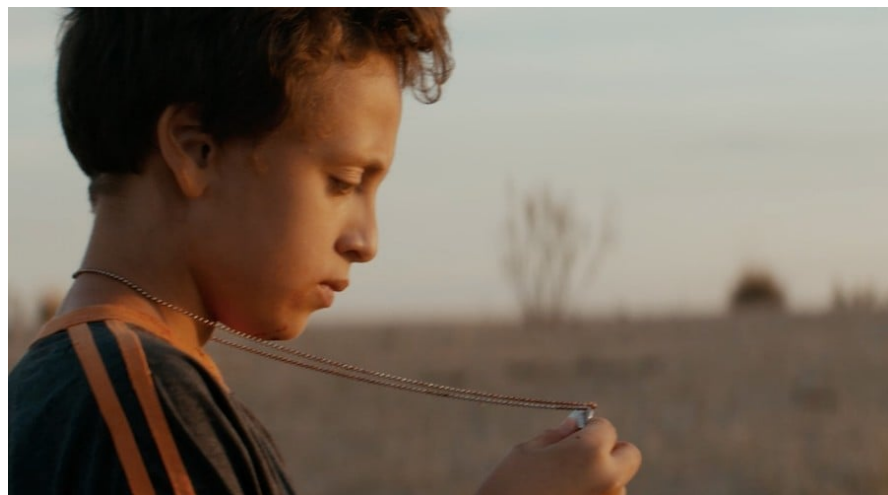




Euroasia Shorts 2017



A selection of short films from Europe, Asia, and the United States will be screened at embassies and cultural centers throughout Washington, D.C.

Now in its eleventh year, EAS began as the Asian European Short Film Showcase and remains an original collaboration between a small group of Washington, D.C. embassies and cultural center staff. The festival has presented more than 200 short films since it began in 2006, including many award-winning shorts making their U.S. debut. Each year presents a variety of films connected by a single theme with post-film discussions on the first four nights, offering an international cinematic dialogue.

The 2017 theme is Truth: we might wish the truth were always simple, but in reality it rarely is. Each of us must reconcile our public persona with our true self in private. How true are we with others in our daily lives? Does censorship foster truth, or hinder it? And when we fail to live up to the truth –through infidelity, lies, or being untrue to our own self– what do we do? The truth can vary from person to person, let alone one culture to another, and yet we all struggle with it. Wherever it leads, we seek it.

DINOSAURIOS

- Directed by Daniel Allué. Spain, 2015, 4 minutes.
- Once a week Miguel, accompanies his grandad to the doctor's surgery. The old man is getting worse day by day and the only thing that keeps him happy is his apparent delusions. On the way back home they change course, entering a surreal world where Miguel's grandad assures to see dinosaurs.

STRINGS

- Directed by Rafael Daniel Evangelista. Philippines, 2016, 6 minutes.
- The story of a puppet that disobeyed.

ITO ANG HULING ARAW (THE LAST DAY)

- Directed by Petersen Vargas. Philippines, 2016, 6 minutes.
- A boy is troubled by bullies at school, until he finds a reason to finally break his silence.

QWERTY

- Directed by Paolo Dy, Philippines, 2007, 6 minutes.
- A mentally-afflicted young man is accused of murdering his longtime benefactor. The truth about what really happened lies in his mad obsession with his supposed victim's old typewriter, on which he types relentlessly, day and night.
