JOHNNY LOVES DOLORES

- Directed by Clarissa de los Reyes, Philippines, 2012, 27 minutes. In Tagalog with English subtitles.
- As an immigrant community hustles to keep afloat during the 2008 recession, a lonely, underpaid clerk is forced to consider a lucrative Green Card Marriage that runs counter to his belief of marrying for love. But when an undocumented immigrant he secretly loves finds herself in financial need, he sacrifices even his own happiness for her sake. More than a love story, "Johnny Loves Dolores" is about a community struggling with the devastating effects of the recession, and how money has become a currency for love.
