This photography exhibition depicts how Ibero-American countries have opened up to foreign people, celebrating the diversity that have led to today's merged cultures.

The Iberoamerican Cultural Attachés Association (AACIA) contributes to [FotoWeekDC](#) with the photography exhibition *Immigration in Ibero-America*, aiming to show the positive cultural, social, and economic influence of immigrants in the Ibero-American countries. The exhibit features artworks from seventeen countries, including the work *Miguel de Moreno* by Spanish photographer [Javier Hirschfeld](#).

In his work *Miguel de Moreno*, Hirschfeld reflects both on the contribution of immigration and the achievement of civil rights in Spanish society. The author presents a discourse about the “other”, the one that we consider different from us, all while paying homage to Spanish Copla singer Miguel de Molina, who lived in exile at a time when political affiliation and sexual orientation drove many Spaniards away from home.
