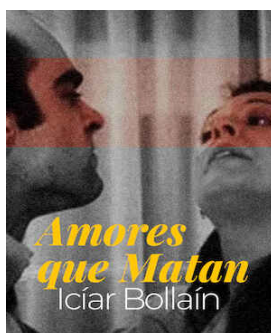

A LOVE THAT KILLS

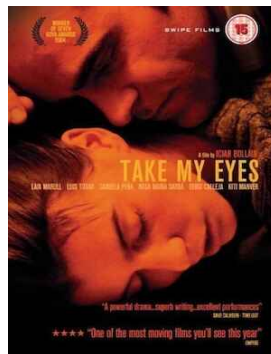
